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COMMON CORE INSTRUCTIONAL MATH SHIFTS

Under the common core standards there are six instructional shifts in the area of Math. The intent of standards is to prepare our students for college and careers for the 21st century.

Shift 1	Focus	Teachers significantly narrow and deepen the scope of how time and energy is spent in the math classroom. They do so in order to focus deeply on only the concepts that are prioritized in the standards.
Shift 2	Coherence	Principals and teachers carefully connect the learning within and across grades so that students can build new understanding onto foundations built in previous years.
Shift 3	Fluency	Students are expected to have speed and accuracy with simple calculations; teachers structure class time and/or homework time for students to memorize, through repetition, core functions.
Shift 4	Deep Understanding	Students deeply understand and can operate easily within a math concept before moving on. They learn more than the trick to get the answer right. They learn the math.
Shift 5	Application	Students are expected to use math and choose the appropriate concept for application even when they are not prompted to do so.
Shift 6	Dual Intensity	Students are practicing and understanding. There is more than a balance between these two things in the classroom – both are occurring with intensity.

REQUIRED FLUENCIES IN THE COMMON CORE STATE STANDARDS FOR MATHEMATICS

When it comes to measuring the full range of the Standards, usually the first things that come to mind are the mathematical practices, or perhaps the content standards that call for conceptual understanding. However, the Standards also address another aspect of mathematical attainment that is seldom measured at scale either: namely, whether students can perform calculations and solve problems quickly and accurately. At each grade level in the Standards, one or two fluencies are expected:

Grade	Required Fluency
K	Add/subtract within 5
1	Add/subtract within 10
2	Add/subtract within 20 ¹ Add/subtract within 100 (pencil and paper)
3	Multiply/divide within 100 ² Add/subtract within 1000
4	Add/subtract within 1,000,000
5	Multi-digit multiplication
6	Multi-digit division Multi-digit decimal operations
7	Solve $px+q=r$, $p(x+q)=r$
8	Solve simple 2×2 systems by inspection

1 By end of year, know from memory all sums of two one-digit numbers

2 By end of year, know from memory all products of two one-digit numbers

Fluent in the Standards means “fast and accurate.” It might also help to think of fluency as meaning the same thing as when we say that somebody is fluent in a foreign language: when you’re fluent, you flow. Fluent isn’t halting, stumbling, or reversing oneself. Assessing fluency requires attending to issues of time (and even perhaps rhythm, which could be achieved with technology).

The word *fluency* was used judiciously in the Standards to mark the endpoints of progressions of learning that begin with solid underpinnings and then pass upward through stages of growing maturity. In fact, the rarity of the word itself might easily lead to fluency becoming invisible in the Standards—one more among 25 things in a grade, easily overlooked. Assessing fluency could remedy this, and at the same time allow data collection that could eventually shed light on whether the progressions toward fluency in the Standards are realistic and appropriate.

NEWS FROM THE GYM

We have gotten off to a fast start in PE. This month the children in kindergarten through third grades have been working on foot-eye coordination with a variety of soccer skills. The children in grades four through six have been working on flag football. Intramurals will be starting the last week of September. Flag Football will be on Mondays, Soccer will be on Tuesdays, and Recreational Games (Rec Games) will be held on

Thursdays. Please be prompt in picking up your child at 4:50 pm. Pick up is in the gymnasium.

Please remember that children need to wear traditional sneakers and short sleeve shirts for PE class and for intramurals. Jewelry, including dangling earrings, is not allowed and long hair should be tied back. Thanks for your cooperation.



KINDERGARTEN NEWS

Kindergarten is off to a great start. The children have adjusted nicely to the long day and they are quickly learning the rules and routines of our school. In September we focused on identifying colors and shapes. In math we are learning to count to 30 and are learning to write numbers from 1 - 5. In ELA we are focusing on Concepts About Print (identifying the front cover, title page and defining the roles of an author and

illustrator). In readers workshop we will learn how to handle books correctly and discuss that different books are read for different purposes. In writer's workshop we will learn to write a story from our memory. For Constitution week we worked together in groups to create a Preamble Quilt. In October we look forward to our first celebration for Halloween!


